### **Iroquois National Wildlife Refuge Volunteer Receives America the Beautiful Volunteer Pass**

Carl Zenger of Lockport, NY became the first volunteer at Iroquois National Wildlife Refuge (NWR), and the first in the Northeast Region of the National Wildlife Refuge System, to receive the new ***America the Beautiful Interagency Volunteer Pass***. Anthony Leger, Chief of Refuges for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Region 5, presented Carl with the pass on April 14 at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Northeast Region Friends Conference held in Philadelphia, PA in recognition of accumulating 500 volunteer hours at the refuge since January 1, 2007. The Volunteer Pass is one of four new passes established under the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act passed by congress in December 2004.

Carl started volunteering at the Refuge in 1996 and has accrued over 6,000 hours. A member of the New York Blue Bird Society, Carl organizes and trains other volunteers to help monitor and maintain approximately 80 blue bird nest boxes throughout the summer. He also assists in habitat management projects, carpentry, building maintenance and many other areas. Carl is one of the founding members and current president of the Friends of Iroquois NWR, Inc., a non-profit organization that works to support wildlife conservation and
